PEOPLE IN need in Leeds are being given a helping hand by volunteers working with the St Vincent de Paul Society (SVP)

Volunteers in community support projects such as the St Vincent's Advice and Support centre, St Jude's furniture store, and community shops around the city make a real difference to the lives of families, refugees, unemployed and people living in poverty through the range of services they provide.

There are also 600 volunteer members of the SVP in and around Leeds, who belong to parish groups known as con-ferences attached to churches around the city.

Volunteer members visit and befriend people in need in their own homes, offering them a listening ear, and providing practical assistance like food parcels, furniture, help with paying essential bills, clothing, and giving them support.

Andrew Winfield has been a member of the SVP for 30 years, and belongs to the SVP group at Immaculate Heart of Mary par-

ish, Moortown. He said: "We have helped families by providing carpets,

white goods, furniture, food, and helping with bills. We also refer people to the St Vincent's Support centre where they have counselling and benefits advice.

"We recently helped a single parent family who were asylum seekers fleeing persecution in their home country, and who had come to England with nothing. We helped them get specialist immigration advice, and talk to the local council about their housing needs."

"I am engaging with people who are less fortunate than me and trying to improve their lives. I also enjoy the companionship and support within the group, and thirdly the individual spiritual uplifting you get which is part of being a member. It's very wide and all encompassing.
