## SVP puts on a blooming good show for Manx flower festival

Isle of Man: Manx members of the St Vincent de Paul Society (SVP) put their green fingers to good use when they took part in the island's annual flower festival.

St Anthony of Padua's parish was one of 19 churches and heritage buildings which took part, staging displays over a seven-day period for

This year the Catholic Deanery Church of St Mary of the Isle decided to join in and the two sister churches of St Joseph's and St Anthony's were encouraged to take part as well.

Organisers chose the theme of Supporting Achievement and the SVP group - or conference as they are officially known - of St Anthony's

decided to adopt "Only through God can we Achieve Great Things" as their slogan.

St Anthony's SVP member Ellen Murray said members considered "how we could describe in flowers a few areas of our day to day parish work". So floral arrangements were made for each of the four core areas of SVP charitable work.

The main area of SVP work is visiting lonely and isolated people at home for a cup of tea and a chat. To represent this area of SVP work, a tea table was dressed with flowers.

Next was fuel support, where a log basket and coal scuttle amongst the flowers represented the help SVP members give to lonely older people and poor families who are often confined to their homes for long hours, without sufficient money to heat their homes

A third area was family support, illustrated by a basket of groceries, and the final area was twinning with SVP conferences in developing countries. It consisted of a beautiful Indian

Ellen added: "The display was very well received and was described as being "alive with colour". I wish to congratulate everyone at St Anthony's SVP parish for their hard work".

## Expert helps train teachers in Tanzania

A researcher at Leeds Trinity University is training teachers in Tanzania to help special needs students.

Dr Jonathan Glazzard spent a week in Tanzania with higher education experts from the University of Dar es Salaam to develop curriculum materials for primary school teachers.

He said: "It's been extremely well received with representatives from Tanzanian government emphasising the importance of education and teacher training."

The project, funded by UNICEF, was established following the Tanzanian government's Strategy for Inclusive Education released in 2013, which emphasised the need for schools to develop inclusive practices.
